

Candidates must be currently teaching K-12th grade in public or private schools in Pickens County.



South Carolina Envirothon is a South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) program for high school students to learn more about our natural environment.

During the Envirothon, high school student teams are tested on their knowledge of five areas of environmental science (wildlife, forestry, soil science, aquatics, and a current topic) and their performance on an oral presentation.

Teams consist of 3-5 students plus an alternate (optional) in grades 9-12.

Each team must have the support of a team coach.

The 2024 Competition Theme is *"Renewable Energy for a Sustainable Future."* A free coaches' training will be held on

February 3, 2024. The student competition will be held on April 26, 2024.

### To qualify, farmland must:

- be part of a pending offer from a State, tribe, or local farmland protection program
- be privately owned;
- have a conservation plan for highly erodible land;
- be large enough to sustain agricultural production;
- be accessible to markets for what the land produces;
- have adequate infrastructure and agricultural support services;
- and have surrounding parcels of land that can support long-term agricultural production.
- Depending on funding availability, proposals must be submitted by the eligible entities to the appropriate NRCS State Office during the application window.

# Natural Resources Conservation Service United States Department of Agriculture

USDA recognizes that conservation by farmers, ranchers and forest owners today means thriving and sustainable agriculture for our future. Seventy percent of the nation's land is privately owned and conservation of our nation's private lands not only results in healthy soil, water, air, plants, animals and ecosystems, it also provides productive and sustainable working lands. https://www.usda.gov/topics/conservation

### Agricultural Conservation Easement Program

The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program provides matching funds to help purchase development rights to keep productive farm and ranchland in agricultural uses. Working through existing programs, USDA partners with State, tribal, or local governments and non-governmental organizations to acquire conservation easements or other interests in land from landowners. USDA provides up to 50 percent of the fair market easement value.

## Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) offers landowners incentives to conserve soil, water, and wildlife habitat. Landowners can apply to enroll highly erodible land and other environmentally sensitive areas in the CRP. By enrolling land, a landowner can receive annual rental payments and cost share benefits to implement conservation practices. Contact the local Farm Service Agency at 864.467.2755. The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (2002 Farm Bill) (Pub. L. 107-171) amended the Food Security Act of 1985 to authorize the program. CRP is administered by Farm Service Agency.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is a new program designed to identify conservation concerns and set conservation priorities to address soil erosion, water quality, wildlife habitat and other resource issues through a community based process. EQIP is available in all 46 counties to address statewide resource concerns. Technical and financial assistance is available to assist landowners in addressing resource concerns on their property.
